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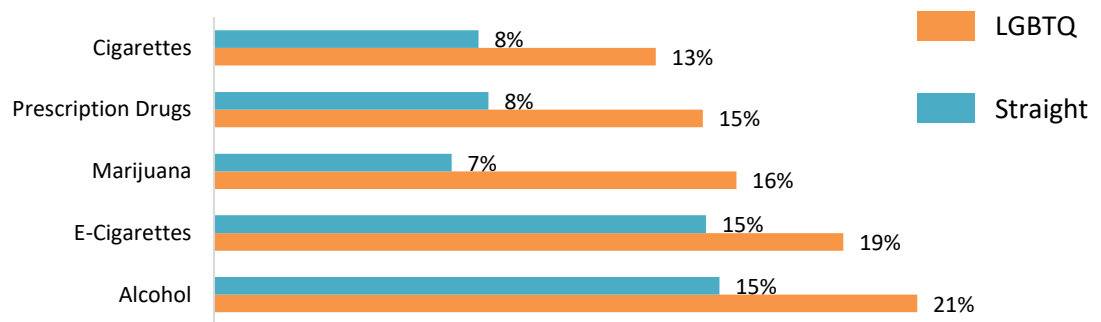

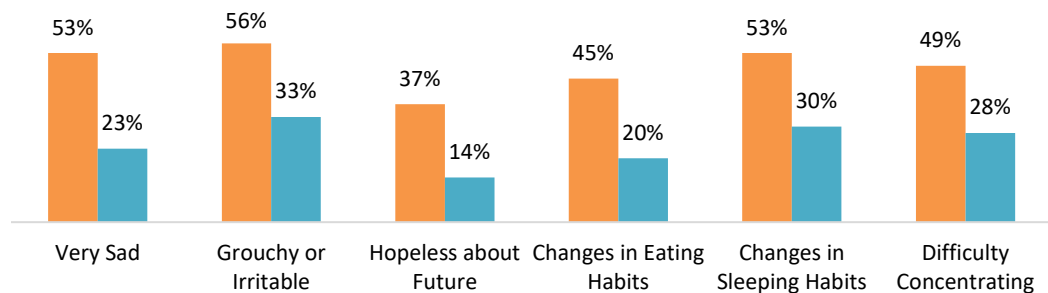

In the United States, lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, or questioning (LGBTQ) individuals are over twice as likely to experience substance use, depression and anxiety, and 4 times as likely to have suicide attempts compared to those identifying as straight.^{1,3} Missouri data shows similar patterns.

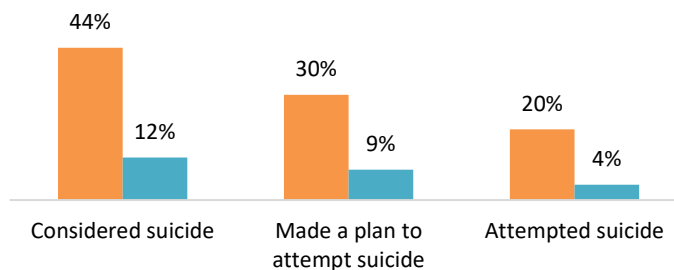
In Missouri, LGBTQ youth consistently report higher rates of substance use than their straight peers.²



Similarly, many more LGBTQ youth report experiencing symptoms of depression than straight students.²



The rate of LGBTQ suicide attempts in Missouri is nearly five times that of straight youth.²
