DBH Updates, Notices, and Policy Guidance June 26, 2020

- 1. Missouri Selected to Participate in a National Initiative Missouri is one of only six states selected to participate in a national initiative to share successes regarding finding and maintaining employment for individuals with serious mental illness and co-occurring disorders. Westat is a national multi-disciplinary team of researchers who have defined the Individual Placement and Support (IPS) approach to supported employment. This group along with NASMHPD and the Council of State Administrators of Vocational Rehabilitation asked DMH experts to join their core IPS group. DMH employment experts will serve as mentors and answer questions from other states that have not yet implemented the IPS evidenced-based practices. Experts will be available by email, phone and periodic webinars.
- 2. Missouri Trauma-Informed Schools DMH is working with the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE) to develop trauma-informed schools. DBH's Children's Services and the Office of Deaf Services are working with the Missouri School for the Deaf (MSD) to identify mental health service needs for students and their families. A recent meeting with department staff, contracted community providers, and the MSD helped identify existing resources and gaps in services. This group will continue to work to enhance behavioral health supports.
- 3. **Missouri HERO Program** Since 2009, DMH in partnership with St. Patrick Center in St. Louis has operated one of the most successful Veteran's Administration Grant Per Diem programs in the country. The Missouri HERO (Housing, Employment, Recovery, Opportunities) Program serves veterans with complex issues, often accepting participants that other programs reject. Outcomes for the HERO program continue to exceed national program targets.
 - 94% of Veterans leave the HERO to permanent housing. National target is 65%.
 - 70% of Veterans leave the HERO to employment. National target is 50%.
 - 6.25% of Veterans leave the HERO as unsuccessful. National target is below 23%.
- 4. Burrell Behavioral Health Awarded \$767,184 from FCC to expand Missouri Telehealth Services in Response to COVID-19 Burrell Behavioral Health has been awarded \$767,184 by the Federal Communications Commission to help fund telehealth programs in central and southwest Missouri in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. Burrell's application was approved in the latest set of distributions from the FCC's COVID-19 Telehealth Program, which was authorized by the CARES Act. Burrell's allocation will fund laptop computers, mobile hotspots, network upgrades, and videoconferencing equipment to expand and offer connected mental health services for Missourians affected by COVID-19, including existing mental health patients, new patients experiencing anxiety related to COVID-19, and essential, front-line workers. "For years Burrell has set the pace for telehealth access to behavioral health services in Missouri, and COVID-19 has only reinforced the need for and value of these programs for the people we serve across our 17 Missouri counties," said Burrell President & CEO C.J. Davis. "We are so appreciative of the FCC's trust and partnership, and can't wait to expand our already robust platform to those who need it most, at a time when they need it more than ever." - 5. Newest Member of NSPL As of June 15, Ozark Center became Missouri's fourth National Suicide Prevention Lifeline (NSPL) and began answering calls from Missouri residents. Missouri's other NSPL members are Behavioral Health Response (BHR), CommCARE, and Provident. Ozark Center will provide coverage for the southwestern part of the state including Barton, Jasper, McDonald, and Newton counties. Ozark Center will benefit Missouri residents by helping to ensure their calls are answered in-state and citizens are connected with resources in their local area.
- 6. Recovery Fest in Cape Girardeau Mark your calendars for the Recovery Fest in Cape Girardeau on September 12, 2020! It is a collaborative effort between Family Counseling Center, Gibson Recovery Center, Community Counseling Center, and Mission Missouri to host the event during recovery month. There will be all kinds of events, food, and several guest speakers. We will provide more details closer to the date!
- 7. Proposed Rule Amendment for Community Support in CPR Programs The draft rule amendment has been posted to the DBH website for comments: https://dmh.mo.gov/media/pdf/9-csr-30-4047-community-support-cpr-programs. Updates have been made to staff, documentation, and service delivery requirements (core functions). Comments should be submitted to Debbie McBaine by July 22, 2020.
- 8. COVID Claim Adjustments that Include DMH Claims MO HealthNet (Medicaid) initiated a mass adjustment on claims that had previously rejected that is impacting the June 12, 2020 RA. If your agency is impacted by this, you will see an invoice adjustment on the Medicaid invoice for the June 12, 2020 RA. However when the initial claim rejected, some providers billed DMH for these services, which DMH paid. As a result of the mass adjustment, these claims were paid again. DMH will be removing those duplicate payments on future payments. In addition, when the original claim rejected, a replacement claim was initiated by the provider creating a new claim that <u>was</u> paid by Medicaid. The mass adjustment generated payments for the original claims of which some had already been paid with the replacement claim. Any duplicate payments generated will also be removed from future payments. Please contact <u>Gina Jacobs</u> with any questions.

- 10. **FY21 PPS Rates** Many providers have inquired about their PPS rate beginning July 1, 2020. At this time, the current rate for the agency will remain the same until DBH notifies the agency otherwise. Given the budget situation, OA B&P is reviewing the proposed rate changes and is trying to determine the appropriate course of action moving forward. Please be patient as we are working in uncharted territory. DBH staff will notify providers as soon as a decision is made. Please contact <u>Gina Jacobs</u> with any questions.
- 11. MO HealthNet Asset Limit Increase for FY2021 This memo outlines the MO HealthNet asset limits for FY2021, effective on July 1, 2020. Please share within your facility as needed. Please note that Supplemental Nursing Care and Supplemental Aid to the Blind changed to the increased asset limits on July 1, 2018 (not a typo), to follow the same limits applied to the claimants identified in the first paragraph of the memo.

 - Backdating Enrollment Applications The Missouri Medicaid Audit and Compliance (MMAC) Provider
 Enrollment Unit (PEU) frequently receives requests to backdate provider enrollment applications. MMAC will
 not backdate the effective date of a provider's Missouri Medicaid enrollment prior to the date MMAC received
 the provider's application, except in very specific situations outlined in <u>13 CSR 65-2.020 Provider Enrollment</u>
 and Application: (1) Enrollment, (B). Questions regarding enrolling with the MO HealthNet program can be
 emailed to <u>MMAC PEU</u>.

- COVID-19: Co-Payment Revised 06/24/20 Effective with dates of service on or after January 1, 2020, and through the end of the public health emergency, MO HealthNet is waiving the co-payment for ALL services. MO HealthNet will process a mass adjustment to remove the co-payment for claims with dates of service on or after January 1, 2020. Pharmacy shared dispensing fees are calculated by the billing provider. Pharmacies should refer to the previous pharmacy co-payment hot tips. Providers who have collected copayments from participants for dates of service January 1, 2020 through the end of the public health emergency must refund the copayments to the participants. Shared dispensing fees should not be retroactively adjusted.

15. Missouri Credentialing Board (MCB) Announcements –

- MCB, in conjunction with the DMH, is transitioning to virtual instruction for the Certified Peer Specialist training and Peer Specialist Supervisor Training for the remainder of 2020. The decision to move to virtual instruction was not made lightly. The goal of these changes is to minimize the need to gather in large groups and spend prolonged time in close proximity with each other in a classroom setting. These actions are consistent with the recommendations of leading health officials on how to limit the spread of COVID-19. The goal is to return to live, in-person trainings when appropriate.

- 16. **Hand Sanitizer WARNING** With the shortages around hand sanitizer, many people were buying whatever they could get their hands on in the first few months of the pandemic. Because of that, the <u>FDA issued a warning</u> on nine alcohol-based hand sanitizers manufactured by Eskbiochem. The sanitizer contains wood methanol that is toxic if placed on the skin or ingested. The nine types are:
 - All-Clean Hand Sanitizer (NDC: 74589-002-01)
 - Esk Biochem Hand Sanitizer (NDC: 74589-007-01)
 - CleanCare NoGerm Advanced Hand Sanitizer 75% Alcohol (NDC: 74589-008-04)
 - The Good Gel Antibacterial Gel Hand Sanitizer (NDC: 74589-010-10)
 - CleanCare NoGerm Advanced Hand Sanitizer 80% Alcohol (NDC: 74589-005-03)
 - CleanCare NoGerm Advanced Hand Sanitizer 75% Alcohol (NDC: 74589-009-01)
 - CleanCare NoGerm Advanced Hand Sanitizer 80% Alcohol (NDC: 74589-003-01)
